About the Artists



Dr. Allan Laiño Artistic Director Congressional Chorus

American Prize winner Allan Laiño ("lah-EE-nyoh" or / la '?i njo /) is the fourth Artistic Director of the Congressional Chorus. As a second-generation Filipino-American with wide-ranging musical influences, he aims to reshape the landscape of American choral artistry by creating an environment in which all voices can flourish.

Laiño has prepared choral ensembles for the National Symphony Orchestra, the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra and Marin Alsop, BSO Pops and Jack Everly, NSO Pops and Steven Reineke, Piedmont Symphony Orchestra, Game of Thrones Live Concert Experience, and the Josh Groban Live National Tour. He has conducted onstage at the Kennedy Center Concert Hall, Kennedy Center Opera House, and Alice Tully Hall at the Lincoln Center. His performances have been televised on programs such as the 2018 Kennedy Center Honors, CNN's Live from the Capitol: January 6, One Year Later, and EWTN's Annual Christmas Concert for Charity broadcast to over

140 countries worldwide.

As Co-Artistic Director of Bridge, Laiño produced, edited, directed, and sang in America, You're Beautiful, a short film that merged spoken word and choral music to examine racism in America. The film won the Black Truth Film Festival, Queens Underground International Black and Brown Film Festival, and Shortie Film Festival. As Co-Conductor of the Sunday Night Singers in 2012, he earned First Prize at the World Choir Games in the Mixed Chamber Choir Champions Division. He is the 2018 winner of The American Prize—Community Chorus Division, and was a finalist in two categories for the 2020 The American Prize in Composition. In 2021, Laiño was the music awardee for The Outstanding Filipinos in America presented at Carnegie Hall.



NorthEast Senior Singers (NESS)

The NorthEast Senior Singers (NESS) is one of the only programs in the District that provides musical opportunities specifically for the elderly with a focus on providing older residents with performance-centered experiences alongside a community of younger singers. NESS singers generally perform three concerts each season, including a joint concert with the American Youth Chorus and Chamber Ensemble each spring.

NESS has been featured in a PBS documentary about "Arts and Aging," and stands as an example of how music can foster creative vitality in senior citizens. Studies have shown that singing can have many health benefits for seniors, including strengthened memory, enhanced, healing, improved immune system, expanded lung capacity, increased cognition, and more.



Deloris Agee Program Director NorthEast Senior Singers

Deloris has been a member of the NorthEast Senior Singers since 2003. Since assuming the role of teaching artist in Fall 2020, Deloris has helped prepare members to participate in an all virtual season. Under her direction the chorus produced its first virtual concert, This Little Light of Mine, and a full-length holiday concert, Proclaiming the Season: Peace, Love, and Joy. Deloris brings to this position over 30 years of experience as a choir director for all age groups. Her experience in the area of creative arts includes drama and play writing. For the past two years she has been the creator and program manager for the Puppets for Potential where she crafted over 25 hand puppets.





George Stewart Music Director NorthEast Senior Singers

George Stewart is a widely sought-after musician due, in part to his versatility and love for music regardless of denomination or genre. George joined the Congressional Chorus during the 2021-2022 season. He has been blessed to share his gift in various venues ranging from small Pentecostal storefront churches to television studios, in concert halls on both coasts, with his past choir, Pentecostal Glory, being the first African-American Catholic Gospel Choir to perform at the historic Ford's Theatre in Washington, DC.

Among George's greatest honors was being invited to perform at the White House for its annual Black History Month Celebration in February 2021 and to grace the altar as one of the musicians for the Junipero Serra Canonization Mass celebrated by Pope Francis at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC.

George served more than 35 years as choir director, accompanist and minister of music for several area churches and played on several recordings including the GIA-published "Catholic Classics, Volume VII," and the Holy Comforter St Cyprian's Church Choir's "We Offer Praise." He currently serves as the director of music for the Holy Comforter St Cyprian's Church.



Maria Balducci Pianist

Maria Balducci, a native of the Washington DC area, is the Director of Music and Organist at St. Joseph's Church on Capitol Hill. Maria's degrees in piano performance are from Oberlin College (B.M.) and Roosevelt University (M.M.). She has previously served as keyboardist for the Civic Orchestra of Chicago and accompanist for Chicago Opera Theater. Locally, Maria has served as accompanist for National Children's Chorus and works closely with the American Federation Pueri Cantores, the international children's choral organization of the Catholic Church. Maria and her husband Michael Voigt reside in Alexandria, VA, with their four young boys.



Hyun Ji Choi Cellist

Cellist Hyun Ji Choi enjoys a versatile career as a soloist, chamber musician, and orchestral player. She has been heard in venues as diverse as the Alice Tully Hall of the Lincoln Center, Weill Recital Hall at Carnegie Hall, and Smithsonian Museum in Washington D.C. to name a few. Her artistry

has taken her to perform in South Korea, Japan, Canada, Mexico, and Argentina as a soloist and a chamber musician. While living in Chicago, she performed a wide selection of solo cello and chamber music repertoires as a member of Apas Duo/Trio, appearing as a frequent and regular guest in many of the recital series and educational programs for public libraries, hospitals, and community centers in the region. She was a member of the Grand Rapids Symphony in Michigan and now appears as a guest musician for the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra.



Gaayatri Kaundinya's journey as a composer began with her extensive training in Indian music from the world renowned Sarod Maestro Ustad Ali Akbar Khan. With the unique experience of studying vocal music from an instrumentalist, she was exposed to the ins and outs of Indian instruments and orchestration alongside her vocal music training. With the rigor of Hindustani training, she developed strong ear training precision, and a prolific ability to improvise and compose music.

Professionally, her production work with AR Rahman was her first exposure to writing commercial music that blended Indian music with cinematic music. While assisting on his projects, she experimented with blending her unique Indian music training into the media music language.

She developed a unique sound and perspective on crossover music composition and representing blended identities in storytelling. This opened up opportunities to take part in major projects in Hollywood, Bollywood, and beyond.



Ram Eshwar Kaundinya Percussionist

Ram Eshwar Kaundinya has been a life long percussionist. He started playing on human heads, graduated to the Indian Classical Hand Drums (Tablas), and is a multi-percussionist. Training with the likes of Pandit Swapan Chaudhuri, Chuck Brown, and James Newton, Ram has also been a bandleader with his group Kune Do. Today Ram brings his artistic and scientific pursuits to the world of game development with Firaxis Games.



Marjan Naderi Poet

Marjan Naderi, the 2020 D.C. Youth Poet Laureate, is an Afghan-American writer and

educator based in Washington, D.C. As a 7-time Poetry Grand Slam Champion, Naderi has been featured on The Washington Post, NPR, The United Nation's Girl Up Campaign, NBC News, Nike, and more. Her writing has been recognized by The Adroit Journal, Brave New Voices, The Split This Rock Poetry Database, and The National YoungArts Foundation where she was nominated for the U.S. Presidential Scholar in the Arts Award. Her first chapbook, Bloodline, was released in 2019.

As an educator, Naderi has facilitated writing workshops across the nation. She's taught Quranic Studies at The Afghan Academy and founded the Washington International Academy Library. She's currently working with international non-profits to build schools and libraries in Afghanistan and The Gambia. Her work is featured in curricula including Fairfax County Public Schools, Bryant University, The University of Virginia, and L.M.S. Voice.

Naderi, 20, now attends The University of Virginia. She's currently working on her next chapbook, a memoir to Afghanistan.



Manuel Pelayo de Góngora Reeds

Musician 1st Class Manuel Pelayo de Góngora

was born in Holguin, Cuba, where he started his musical studies at the age of ten. At 18, he moved to the capital city, Havana, where he had the opportunity to join several bands as a professional saxophonist, including "Klimax," led by Cuban percussionist and composer Gerardo Piloto. He performed at multiple festivals such as the North Sea Jazz Fest in Holland, Vienna Jazz Fest, Nice Jazz Festival, New Morning, Perpignan Jazz Festival, Jazz Fort- Medoc 97, Millau Jazz in France, Jazzhaus in Germany, Roskilde Festival in Denmark, Monteux Jazz Festival in Switzerland and Barbican Centre in England. Pelayo has also performed at the Blue Note in Paris and at Ronnie Scott's Jazz Club in London.

In 2000, he moved to Puerto Rico to continue his musical career, exploring new genres and instruments including flute and clarinet. He played in different bands and with different artists such as Quique Talavera, San Juan-Habana, Cesar Concepción, Juan Vélez, Elias López, Cultura Profética, Tego Calderón, León de Judá, Chucho Avellanet, Melina León, Tito el Bambino and others. He also participated in Olga Tañón's musical, touring the United States and Caracas in 2003, and performed with Humberto Ramirez's band at the Heineken Jazz Fest in 2003 and Tito de Gracia's band "Naoka Jam" at the Heineken Jazz Fest in 2004. Additionally, he played with Paquito de Rivera, Dave Valentin, Giovanni Hidalgo and Chick Corea, performing on more than 15 recordings.



Cristian Perez Guitarist

Cristian Perez is an Argentine-American guitarist/composer/arranger currently based in Northern Virginia. He graduated from GMU with a BM in Classical guitar ('10) and a MM in Jazz Studies ('12). Cristian has performed internationally (Bulgaria, Canada, South Korea, Bolivia, China, Dominican Republic) and continues to be very active in the local music scene. His debut album "Anima Mundi" has received numerous reviews throughout the world and reached #13 in the CMJ World Music charts in the USA. Cristian is a former Artist in Residence at Strathmore ('15). He won 2 Wammie Awards (2022) with the band Project Locrea. He has been featured on Vintage Guitar Magazine. Cristian is currently a Kremona Guitars Artist as well as an MCO Guitars Artist



Grace Srinivasan Soprano

Praised for her "beautiful vocalism" (San Francisco Gate) and engaging presence, soprano Grace Srinivasan has established herself in the Baltimore-Washington area as a performer of a wide spectrum of repertoire ranging from the Renaissance to contemporary compositions. Grace's recent roles include Despina (Cosi Fan Tutte), High Priestess (Marais' Semele), Belinda (Dido and Aeneas), and Laurie Moss (The Tender Land), as well as solos in Bach's Mass in B Minor, Handel's Messiah, Monteverdi's Vespers, and Mozart's Vesperae Solennes.

A Washington, D.C. area native, Grace sings professionally as a cantor and soprano at St. Stephen Martyr Catholic Church in D.C. and as a soprano at Washington National Cathedral. She has sung with groups throughout the region including the Washington Bach Consort, the National Symphony Orchestra, Cantate Chamber Singers and The Washington Chorus at venues such as the Kennedy Center and Wolf Trap.



Come for a fun, simple, individual singing session. Get to know the conductor, and ask any questions.
